

#002 KeyVerse series to help the Curious understand Jesus

A DiscipleMaker can't assume that people understand Jesus. They may have a limited or even distorted view of him. It does little good to have them believe in a designer Jesus, one of their own making. What to do? Consider sending KeyVerses. This series of KeyVerses takes the Curious step by step toward Jesus. It's not meant to give all the answers; it should raise probing questions. A person can do their own search and discovery, *Who is this Jesus?*

This series is a sequel to the #001 Series, *Discovering God*, and a prequel to #003 series, *Coming to Jesus*. There are 35 KeyVerses in the *Understanding Jesus* series. The series will last seven weeks, if sent Monday-Friday. Each KeyVerse has a Bible verse about Jesus and a short comment. The KeyVerses may prompt a Seeker to ask questions of a DiscipleMaker. Do your best to answer them!

The 35 KeyVerses, *Understanding Jesus*, are listed below.

Week One:

Day 1:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: Jesus and his disciples left Galilee and went up to the villages near Caesarea Philippi. As they were walking along, he asked them, "Who do people say I am?" "Well," they replied, "some say John the Baptist, some say Elijah, and others say you are one of the other prophets." Then he asked them, "But who do you say I am?" (The Bible, Mark 8.27-29) It's a good question for us, (name), as well as for the disciples, *who is this Jesus?* Is he someone in past history, a person we can ignore? Is he a good teacher, like Buddha, Confucius or others? Or is he actually God-who-became-human to bring us back to himself? That's what we want to

discover in the next days with our KeyVerses: **who Jesus is and why we should follow him.**

Day 2:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: **...for through him [Jesus] God created everything in the heavenly realms and on earth. He made the things we can see and the things we can't see—such as thrones, kingdoms, rulers, and authorities in the unseen world. Everything was created through him and for him. (The Bible, Colossians 1.16)** Most people don't believe this at all. They think the universe doesn't belong to anyone. It's just there. But imagine if it's true, it does belong to someone. Everything. What we can see and what we can't, like the invisible reality of the spirit world. So who does it belong to? Jesus! He designed and made it all for his pleasure and enjoyment, like we might build a house, fill it with furniture, landscape the yard and enjoy it. Could it be possible that everything in the universe belongs to Jesus? Including us? This means we're made to give Jesus pleasure, (name). That thought can be unsettling~

Day 3:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: **"The Son [Jesus] radiates God's own glory and expresses the very character of God, and he sustains everything by the mighty power of his command. (The Bible, Hebrews 1.3a)** What holds the universe together? Physicists tell us four forces stabilize everything: strong and weak forces, electromagnetic and gravitational forces. And who controls those forces? What if Someone did, someone controlled the universe personally? We can hardly believe such a thing, (name), because the universe is so big and complex. This Bible verse stretches our thinking. Could there be Someone bigger than the whole universe, someone controlling it? Could Jesus be that Person?

Day 4

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: **For in Christ [Jesus] lives all the fullness of God in a human body. (The Bible, Colossians 2.9)** Who God is or what he's like would be just a guess for us. Until Jesus came, that is. The Bible states that Jesus is *God-who-became-human*. And he's not just a small slice of God. No, all of God was in this man Jesus, even though he was a poor peasant from a backwater country. It's really strange that God would appear this way, (name). What does it mean? Someone searching for

God must arrive at Jesus, because he is all-God. And it means can get close to him, know him, because he's all-human too.

Day 5:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: [So the Word \[Jesus\] became human and made his home among us. He was full of unfailing love and faithfulness. And we have seen his glory, the glory of the Father's one and only Son. \(The Bible, John 1.14\)](#) We know what it's like to have neighbours live next door, or a roommate living in the same house as us. Now imagine such a person, but totally different from anyone you've ever met before. It makes you wonder, could this person be God? We'd find it almost impossible to believe, (name). How could the person walking down the hall, down the street, be the most important Being in the universe? That's what the Bible claims about Jesus: he is God-as-a-human. He came and moved into the neighbourhood. It seems too amazing to be true!

Week 2

Day 6:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: [The wine supply ran out during the \[wedding\] festivities, so Jesus' mother told him, "They have no more wine." \(John 2.3\)](#) This wedding story begins when Jesus was asked to fix a problem: no more wine. That means the party's over. By the story's end he'd turned water into wine so the celebration could continue. Wow! Everyone would be shocked: no one can do this! But Jesus can, and he did. It made them wonder, *What kind of person is this Jesus?* We should ask the same. We should ask another question: *Why help a wedding couple in crisis?* Jesus is love and power combined, that's why. He loved them and helped them. Could he help us the same way? Hmmm...

Day 7:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: [The official pleaded, "Lord, please come now \[to my city\] before my little boy dies." Then Jesus told him, "Go back home. Your son will live!" And the man believed what Jesus said and started home. \(John 4.49-50\)](#) Here's another story showing us more of Jesus. A father traveled from his city to beg Jesus to come back with him because his son was terminally ill. Instead, Jesus sent the

dad home alone, challenging him to believe the boy would be healed. The dad did believe and headed back. When he got home the next day, he found his son healthy, healed the same hour Jesus predicted it would happen. What kind of person is this, to heal a sick person in another city, (name)? Jesus is different from anyone. And he's full of kindness and love. And power! Like the dad, we get challenged to believe.

Day 8:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: **One of the men lying there [outdoors, by a pool] had been sick for thirty-eight years... Jesus told him, "Stand up, pick up your mat, and walk!" Instantly, the man was healed! He rolled up his sleeping mat and began walking! (John 5.5, 8-9)** If Jesus hadn't encountered this man, he'd be handicapped for the rest of his life. He couldn't heal himself, but Jesus could, and did. Many people get stuck in life, and don't know how to change. Maybe their past is so bad, they can't get over it. Maybe they've made decisions that ruined their life. What if they could encounter Jesus, (name)? Could he change them? Change us? The story answers the question. Yes, of course!

Day 9:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: **Tell everyone to sit down," Jesus said [to his disciples]. So they all sat down on the grassy slopes. (The men alone numbered about 5,000.) Then Jesus took the [five] loaves, gave thanks to God, and distributed them to the people. Afterward he did the same with the [two] fish. And they all ate as much as they wanted. (John 6.10-11)** Perhaps there were 20,000 in the crowd, maybe more, when this story happened. They were poor people mostly, there to hear Jesus teach. When they ran out of food and were hungry, Jesus fed them. It's impossible for anyone to do this, (name), feed thousands with a small lunch. But Jesus did! He's not like us even though he's completely human. He can do the impossible because he's completely God. He proved that he was God, come to our planet to show God's care for those no one else cares for. What is God like? God is like Jesus, full of power and compassion.

Day 10:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: **Soon a gale swept down upon them [the disciples, in a boat], and the sea grew very rough. They'd rowed three or four miles when suddenly they saw Jesus walking on the water toward the boat. They were terrified, but he called out to them, "Don't be afraid. I am here!" (John 6.18-20)** In each

of these stories Jesus shows he can do what no other person can, (name). But he's not showing off, no. He's showing love, using his power to care for people. In the middle of a dangerous storm with the boat capsizing, Jesus appeared to his friends, removed their fear and rescued them. What kind of God is this, who cares so much! That's a good question to wonder about.

Week 3:

Day 11:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: [Then he spit on the ground, made mud with the saliva, and spread the mud over the blind man's eyes. He told him, "Go wash yourself in the pool of Siloam" \(Siloam means "sent"\). So the man went and washed and came back seeing! \(John 9.6-7\)](#) Imagine being blind from birth! Never seeing your mom's face, never seeing the beauty of a sunset. That was this man's experience until Jesus encountered him. Jesus gave him sight – he could finally see! But how strange, Jesus used spit and mud! Why embarrass the handicapped man like that? Could Jesus be talking to us, (name)? Telling us we're blind too, spiritually blind? And warning us, it may be embarrassing to get spiritual sight from him?

Day 12:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: [Then Jesus shouted, "Lazarus, come out!" And the dead man came out, his hands and feet bound in graveclothes, his face wrapped in a headcloth. Jesus told them, "Unwrap him and let him go!" \(John 10.43-44\)](#) What Jesus did in this story got him killed, (name). Why? He stood at a grave, shouted someone's name, and made the dead come alive. Jesus did it for his friend. It was so shocking the religious leaders of his day decided to get rid of him, because so many were following him. They made the wrong decision and ended up on the wrong side of history. They didn't know that Jesus could do more than give life to another. He could even turn death around for himself, coming alive again. That's because he is God. And human, like us. There's never been anyone like him.

Day 13:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: [The woman said, "I know the Messiah is coming—the one who is called Christ. When he comes, he will explain everything to us." Then Jesus told her, "I Am the Messiah!" \(John 4.26\)](#) Jesus not only showed he was

God by his powerful miracles, he told people who he was. If we ask someone, *Who are you?* we expect them to tell us their name. Jesus told us more. He's the Messiah, he said in this story, God's Answer Man. He told this outsider woman who he was. He says the same to you, (name). He's the Problem-Solver, sent from God to help you find meaning and joy in life.

Day 14:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: ...[the disciples] saw Jesus walking on the water toward the boat. They were terrified, but he called out to them, "Don't be afraid. I am [here]!" (John 6.19b-20) Let's revisit a story about Jesus. Remember the storm, men in a boat, about to capsize? Terrifying! Jesus walked from the shore to the boat - we don't know how - and terrified them even more. He called out, *Don't be afraid!* And added, *I AM*. How strange, those words, (name)! Centuries before, when Moses asked God's name, he replied, *I AM*. That's what Jesus said. *I AM*. Meaning, *I am God! The God who helped your ancestors is right here with you!* No wonder the disciples were scared. I'd be too. How unnerving to realize that the mysterious, far-away God is now up-close and personal in Jesus.

Day 15:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: [Jesus] I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry again. Whoever believes in me will never be thirsty. (John 6.35) We encounter the *I AM* again when Jesus takes God's name for himself. This time he expands it, like filling in the blank, *I AM* _____. The day before Jesus said this he fed 5000 families – a miracle. Because food was on the minds of his listeners Jesus applied it to himself. We all need food to survive physically; we all need Jesus to exist spiritually. It's not religion that will help us. No, it's an intimate relationship with him, depending on him like we do on food. Only Jesus can satisfy the hunger and thirst we have been loved, to have purpose, to be at peace with God. An amazing claim Jesus makes, (name)! He's God!

Week 4:

Day 16:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: Jesus spoke to the people once more and said, "I am the light of the world. If you follow me, you won't have to walk in

darkness, because you will have the light that leads to life.” (John 8.12) I AM, God's name. Jesus finished the sentence, I AM _____. *I am the light of the world.* Light in the darkness! Remember being afraid of the dark as a child? *What's out there? Who will keep us safe?* Political leaders tell us, *Follow me, I'll keep you safe!* Religious leaders offer the same. Jesus says, don't listen to them! Instead he calls everyone – the entire world - to follow him because he's God. He knows what's in the darkness, (name), and he's greater than the darkness. But will we follow him? Many don't.

Day 17:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: *Jesus answered, “I tell you the truth, before Abraham was even born, I AM! At that point they [the crowd] picked up stones to throw at him. (John 8.58-59)* Mob violence is dangerous. People get killed. You never want to be in a mob, (name). Jesus faced a mob who tried to kill him because he said two words. *I AM.* We're learning what he meant, Jesus telling us he's God, come to earth to rescue us. He's told the crowd he existed long before Abraham, the famous ancestor of the Jews. Existed before the universe started! He's the eternal God! The crowd reacted to kill him. The question is, how will we react? Will we believe Jesus? Or violently reject him?

Day 18:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: *[Jesus] Yes, I am the gate. Those who come in through me will be saved. They'll come and go freely and will find good pastures. The thief's purpose is to steal and kill and destroy. My purpose is to give them a rich and satisfying life. (John 10.9-10)* Ever felt you're standing outside, looking in at life, but not really experiencing it? That's the image here in this verse about sheep. At night they need a safe place, a sheepfold. During the day they need pasture land that's safe from poisonous weeds and predators. Sheep have no way to defend themselves from attack by wild animals. A shepherd has to protect them - they can't, protect themselves. Jesus uses the *I AM* _____ statement again to show he's the gate, the way into the safe place, the good life. When we see a gate open, we have a choice, (name). Go in or stay out? Same with Jesus.

Day 19:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: [Jesus] I am the good shepherd; I know my own sheep, and they know me, just as my Father knows me and I know the Father. So I sacrifice my life for the sheep. (John 10.14-15) *What's God like?* Jesus shows us with these I AM _____ sentences. Think of a shepherd's care, Jesus tells us. That's what you'll experience when you belong to God. A shepherd is committed to protect the sheep; the same with God. He knows the ones belonging to him, he'll do anything to protect them. The most powerful commitment we can make is to die for someone. It's the deepest love. Not just words, (name), but action. That's what Jesus did, sacrificed his life for us. Does it give you insight, why people become devoted to him?

Day 20:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: Jesus told her [Martha], "I am the resurrection and the life. Anyone who believes in me will live, even after dying. (John 11.25) Death is stronger than life. We all know this, it defeats us all. We're so afraid. At funerals we see how shocked people are. Some get drunk after, they want to hide the fear. It makes us ask, how can anyone claim to be the LIFE. So crazy! If Jesus only spoke words, he would be crazy. When he talked to Martha after her brother's death, she could have interrupted, *But my brother just died! Why don't you make him alive!* That's exactly what Jesus did, (name), brought her brother back to life. Even better, he brought himself back to life after the crucifixion. He pushed death back into life. Wow! Now he challenges us to believe in him. Will we?

Week 5:

Day 21:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: Jesus told him [Thomas], "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one can come to the Father except through me. (John 14.6) We're all like Thomas, trying to figure out life. If there's a God, how do we get to him? If there really is truth, where to find it? Life's so confusing, because it seems there are many different ways to live. No, Jesus tells us. He is the way. If we're serious to search for truth, we'll end up coming to him. He is the truth. And the life. He completes the I AM statements by showing everything we're searching for is found in him. Jesus. Jesus-who-is-God, someone we can love and relate to. And worship. Some do, (name), but many don't.

Day 22:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: Jesus began to tell them [the disciples] that the Son of Man [Jesus' name for himself] must suffer many terrible things and be rejected by the elders, the leading priests, and the teachers of religious law. He would be killed, but three days later he would rise from the dead. (Mark 8.31) We can't understand Jesus without examining his death. Months before he died he predicted what would happen. He mentioned his death often. Do you mention your coming death? No, I don't either. If we had a friend who talked about death so much, we'd be concerned, (name). Why are they so obsessed? We can ask the same about Jesus, why was he so focused about his death? And how can he predict how he'll die? No one can do that! Good questions to ponder.

Day 23:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: [after Jesus healed a handicapped man] the Pharisees [religious leaders] went away and met with the supporters of Herod [political leaders] to plot how to kill Jesus. (Mark 3.6) Early on, Jesus made enemies, men who determined to kill him. Why? Because he challenged their worldview: their religion, politics, lifestyle. He called them to follow him rather than a religion or a political movement. It's the same today, Jesus makes enemies. When people realize they must follow Jesus, some respond. Others react against him like these men did. Everyone to make a decision about him. Us too, (name).

Day 24:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: They [Jesus and his disciples] were now on the way up to Jerusalem, and Jesus was walking ahead of them. The disciples were filled with awe, and the people following behind were overwhelmed with fear. Taking the twelve disciples aside, Jesus once more began to describe everything that was about to happen to him [how he'd be killed]. (Mark 10.32) We're now watching Jesus head toward certain death. His followers were scared but Jesus wasn't, (name), even though he knew what was ahead. Torture and crucifixion! You and I would run far away, but he walked straight into it. Have you any idea why?

Day 25:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: **When they [the soldiers] came to a place called The Skull, they nailed him to the cross. And the criminals were also crucified—one on his right and one on his left. Jesus said, “Father, forgive them, for they don’t know what they're doing.” (Luke 23.33-34)** There are many ways to die. Crucifixion is the worst, the most shameful. His enemies weren't content just to kill him. They wanted to make him suffer too. He died the painful, public death of a common criminal. Full of hate, these men were! And Jesus? Full of love. He chose to forgive, when they chose to hate. You're understanding Jesus at a deeper level now, (name). He's God. He's love. He's willing to sacrifice himself for us.

Day 26:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: **Because God’s children are human beings—made of flesh and blood—the Son [Jesus] also became flesh and blood. For only as a human being could he die, and only by dying could he break the power of the devil, who had the power of death. Only in this way could he set free all who have lived their lives as slaves to the fear of dying. (Hebrews 2.13-14)** It's true, we're all afraid to die. We stay awake at night wondering, worrying. Those with money get frantic - plastic surgery, diets, exercises, cruises - trying to live longer. But they'll die, (name). We all will, and lose everything. All our achievements, all our relationships, all our experiences, gone. Terrifying to think about! Which makes it more amazing that Jesus walked into death, turned around and pushed death back into life. He took charge. He's greater than death. And when we die, he'll take us through. That's his promise, if we trust in him.

Day 27

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: **The people passing by [the execution place] shouted abuse [at Jesus], shaking their heads in mockery. “Look at you now!” they yelled at him. “You said you were going to destroy the Temple and rebuild it in three days. Well then, if you're the Son of God, save yourself and come down from the cross!” ...The leading priests, the teachers of religious law, and the elders also mocked Jesus. ... Even the revolutionaries who were crucified with him ridiculed him in the same way. (Matt. 27.39-41, 44)** How awful to die in such agonizing conditions, like Jesus did. Even worse, he was executed in public. Everyone watched, everyone jeered. He faced the hatred and insults from the crowd and leaders, even from two criminals dying with him. He was surrounded by evil and hatred and violence! All the time, he responded in love,

offering his life to God as a sacrifice, dying for his enemies. This was no normal death, (name), this is no normal man.

Day28

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: Christ suffered for our sins once for all time. He never sinned, but he died for sinners to bring you safely home to God. He suffered physical death, but he was raised to life in the Spirit. (1 Peter 3.18) Perhaps you're learning why the death of Jesus is significant for Christians, It's God's costly way to bring us back to him. We were all outsiders, wandering alone away from God. No more, (name), if we connect to Jesus and through him to God. We get to go home, adopted into the family of God. We could put it this way: Jesus was thrown out so we could be welcomed in. Yes! Such a strange, wonderful story, a strange, wonderful God.

Day 29:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: ...the Jewish leaders demanded, "What are you doing? If God gave you authority to do this, show us a miraculous sign to prove it." "All right," Jesus replied. "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up." "What!" they exclaimed. "It has taken forty-six years to build this Temple, and you can rebuild it in three days?" But when Jesus said "this temple," he meant his own body. After he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered he had said this, and they believed both the Scriptures and what Jesus had said. (John 2.18-22) Jesus not only predicted his death. He predicted his resurrection, promising he'd come alive again. Of course we haven't this power, none of us has. Jesus does! He proved he can push death back into life. Christians believe in Jesus because he not only died for them, he came alive for them too. He kept his promise. We follow him because he's alive today and can give us his new life. It's open to everyone who believes. You too, (name).

Day 30:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: [Paul] I passed on to you what was most important and what had also been passed on to me. Christ died for our sins, just as the Scriptures said. He was buried, and he was raised from the dead on the third day, just as the Scriptures said. He was seen by Peter and then by the Twelve. After that, he was seen by more than 500 of his followers at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. (1 Corinthians 15.3-6) If this story isn't true, (name), we should run far from Jesus, because it would be a fraud. If the story is true, he did come alive again,

appearing to his friends, making them powerful witnesses for him, then everything else is secondary. He's the most important discovery we'll ever make. That's the choice, once we've heard the story of Jesus. Will we follow him and tell others about him? Or will we say it's a lie and refuse his love and help? Many reject him, sadly.

Day 31:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: [Paul] **And if Christ has not been raised [from the dead], then your faith is useless and you are still guilty of your sins. (1 Corinthians 15.17)** Christians should be pitied if Jesus didn't come alive again, (name). They're wasting their time worshipping him. For sure something happened on the first Easter Sunday. His followers were cowards when Jesus died. After Easter Sunday they became courageous witnesses. Paul, who wrote the words above, changed from killing Christians to converting Christians. He became a missionary for Jesus! The resurrection shows that the rest of his story is genuine. His teachings are true, his miracles really happened, Jesus really is God. He really did come to bring us back to God All our sins are forgiven, friendship restored. He'll do this for you, like he did for me.

Day 32:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: [Paul] **Though he [Jesus] was God, he did not think of equality with God as something to cling to. Instead, he gave up his divine privileges; he took the humble position of a slave and was born as a human being. When he appeared in human form, he humbled himself in obedience to God and died a criminal's death on a cross. (Phil. 2.6-8)** Let's summarize our KeyVerses. We learned that Jesus is the most important person in history. Jesus, who is God, stepped came to this planet to bring us back to God. History is "His story". He broke our slavery to sin by becoming a slave. He stopped disaster ahead of us, the judgment of God on us for our rebellion, by the disaster of the cross. He made the way back to God so we can be friends with him. This is love and power mixed. This is wisdom and goodness. Question is, (name), what to do now? Respond to this love, or refuse it? That's what each of us must decide.

Day 33:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: [Saul, later named Paul] **'Who are you, lord?' I asked. And the voice replied, 'I am Jesus the Nazarene, the one you are persecuting.'** I asked, **'What should I do, Lord?'** (Acts 22.8, 10) Does the resurrection

make a difference? Totally, (name). Notice this personal conversation between Jesus and Saul, sworn enemy of Christians (he hunted them down to kill them). Saul was shocked with the encounter with the back-to-life Jesus. But when it happened, this face-to-face vision, he immediately believed - *Lord!* - and immediately asked to get involved. Saul (who changed his name to Paul) became the poster-child follower of Jesus. Me too, I'm a follower of Jesus because of the resurrection. And you?

Day 34:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: [Paul] *God has set a day for judging the world with justice by the man he has appointed, and he proved to everyone who this is by raising him from the dead.*" (Acts 17.31) Sometimes we ask, *What's the point?* when a person talks on and on about a subject, (name). We've gone for weeks talking about Jesus, his claim to be God, his miracles, his death for us and his resurrection. This verse gives the point: Jesus brought God close so we can respond, turn from our independence and rebellion and come back to him. Or not. Whatever we do, there's a consequence. God calls each person to account. We either meet Jesus in the future as Savior or Judge. Sobering.

Day 35:

A KeyVerse to help you understand Jesus better: *Jesus and his disciples left Galilee and went up to the villages near Caesarea Philippi. As they were walking along, he asked them, "Who do people say I am?" "Well," they replied, "some say John the Baptist, some say Elijah, and others say you are one of the other prophets."* Then he asked them, *"But who do you say I am?"* (The Bible, Mark 8.27-29) We started with this verse and this question, *Who is Jesus?* That's what he asked his disciples. We now can answer it ourselves. The famous Oxford professor CS Lewis gave three options: Jesus is Liar, Lunatic or Lord. We might add Legend, a fictitious character like Spiderman. Which was Jesus? Did he lie saying he was God, here to bring us back to himself? Was he crazy, calling himself God? Or is he the Lord, the One in control, whom we should worship and follow? That's a good way to end our series, (name). Your decision, mine too, what to do with Jesus.
